Reflection of the Month: Churches working together provide a glimmer of hope

Bishop Mike Royal, Co Chief Executive of Cinnamon Network UK and part of CTE's Charismatic and Pentecostal Leaders Forum, shares our <u>Reflection of the Month</u> for March 2020...



A recent newspaper article in *The Guardian*, under the heading 'Life Expectancy', highlighted the fact that over the last decade austerity has caused life expectancy to stall in the UK for the first time in a century. During the same period, a third of children were living in poverty for three years running. The socioeconomic picture painted here is depressing, and it's difficult to find any glimmer of hope in what has transpired over the last decade.

But there is a glimmer of hope in the current malaise. Up and down the country, local churches who are rooted in local community have being coordinating a response to people in their communities who are falling through the cracks. The last decade has seen an unprecedented response from churches of different persuasions. Liberal churches, High orthodox churches; conservative evangelical churches and charismatic Pentecostal churches have all adopted best practice projects run by organisations specifically collaborating with local churches to make a difference. At Cinnamon Network UK we seek to encourage everyday local congregations to adopt these best practice projects.

Across the UK, <u>Street Pastors</u> teams have worked with local church networks to be a visible presence on the streets at night. Listening, helping and caring for the community. The great thing about the way they work is that they will only work in an area where churches are willing to work together. I had the privilege of leading the Birmingham Street Pastors team for five years. It was great to see how people from a variety of different backgrounds came together to patrol streets in the North Birmingham area.

In Shropshire, <u>Telford Christians Together</u>, a local Churches Together initiative, recently completed a <u>Cinnamon Faith Action Audit</u> in their community. The Faith Action Audit measured the activity churches and other faith organisations were undertaking in the town. A survey was undertaken and a report written which now forms the basis of conversations with statutory agencies as to what faith organisations are doing and what else they might do in that community.

These opportunities to collaborate not only break down barriers between local churches, but they also show the world that we are one church.

In John 17:20-23 Jesus prayed "I pray also for those who will believe in me through their message... that they may be one as we are one. I in them and you in me so they may be brought to complete unity".

When different churches work together in the community, our unity is a witness to people; not only that the church is a loving community, but that God loves the community. Jesus goes on to say that "then the world will know that you sent me and have loved them"!

There are so many issues where churches have different theological views. It's great when we can journey together ecumenically, putting those issues aside to reach out to the last, the least and the lost. When we do that, we bring credibility to the message of the gospel.

Our words are demonstrated by action, and our actions are an opportunity to speak words of life. So let's get out of our silos and extend an arm of friendship to other churches in our villages, towns and cities, as we commit to work together. Not just once a year during the Week of Christian Unity, but 24/7, 366 days of the year 2020, and beyond!

Bishop Mike Royal is the Co Chief Executive of <u>Cinnamon Network UK</u>, a charity supporting churches with their community engagement. 

Local unity means hundreds of Scarborough children experience the good news

Thanks to local Christian unity, an innovative project reaching out to local schools in Scarborough has been able to continue, sharing the good news with hundreds of children.

A local church in Scarborough has, over the last four years, provided a <u>Lift the Lid</u> Christmas Experience for their local primary school children. Scarborough Christian Fellowship has found them to be hugely



Working with the schools workers from FISS, who are from different churches in the Scarborough area, made a big impact and was a huge help in the preparation and running of the Christmas Experience.

Working together proved to be really beneficial for all, especially for the 580 pupils and 52 staff from 11 local schools who visited the Christmas Experience in 2019.

The Lift the Lid Experience has also been a huge success in several other churches across the country, and has proved to be a great way to connect with local schools.

Lift the Lid's Christmas and Easter Experience are interactive and dramatised presentations for primary school pupils that offers a unique way to learn about these important Christian celebrations. The Experiences are a great way to welcome your local schools to your church building and have proved to be very popular with both staff and pupils.



Archbishop Justin Welby deeply moved by Thy Kingdom Come's ecumenical dimension

Church leaders and representatives from various denominations and para church organisations gathered for the international launch of Thy Kingdom Come 2020 at Lambeth Palace, exactly four years to the day it was first launched.



Pete Greig from 24-7 Prayer also shared his excitement at seeing 65 Christian traditions across 172 countries now involved, meaning "Thy Kingdom Come has been catalytic in Christian unity".

Uniting in prayer

The prayer movement, taking place from 21st-31st May 2020, has the support of all the main leaders of key denominations in the UK, including the Methodist Church of Great Britain, Catholic Church of England and Wales, Pentecostal Churches, Free Churches, Orthodox Churches and the Church of Scotland. It was also commended by Her Majesty the Queen and His Holiness Pope Francis, head of the global Catholic church, last year.

The Archbishop of Canterbury Justin Welby, Pete Greig (24-7 Prayer), Bishop Nicholas Hudson (Roman Catholic Diocese of Westminster) and Teresa Carvalho (Catholic Bishops

Conference of England and Wales) participated in the launch event at Lambeth Palace on 25th February 2020, aimed at encouraging international audiences to take part in the 11 day period of prayer from Ascension to Pentecost.

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Christians from around the world, including Australia, Brazil, Papua New Guinea, Netherlands, Thailand, Mauritius, South Sudan, America and Canada tuned into watch the launch as it was livestreamed on Facebook.

The power of prayer

In his main address, Archbishop Justin Welby spoke about the potential life-changing power of prayer during Thy Kingdom Come:

"What excites me is that as we come together and pray for people to be filled with the Spirit, so they come to know and love Jesus Christ, to repent of their sins and turn away from all that is wrong and to find the love of Christ filling their hearts, we are in fact praying for the changing of our world."

Pete Greig, founder of <u>24-7 Prayer</u>, also shared during the event, reflecting on the wider context of prayer and the various global movements happening, as well as drawing on his experience of leading global phenomenon 24-7 Prayer over the last 20 years. He said of Thy Kingdom Come:

"How wonderful this prospect of coming together from May 21-31st to pray as one – Come Holy Spirit and Let Your Kingdom Come. I would say to my fellow pastors, vicars and priests – in the busyness of all that we do, let this be the priority. Let us get behind this and let us have grace for one another in this, because I believe Jesus is calling us to pray. This has the marks of the Holy Spirit upon it."



Prayer resources coming soon

The launch event also previewed new resources for 2020, including an exciting print/digital resource which will be distributed to almost half a million Key Stage 2 aged school children in Church of England and Methodist Schools across England and Wales.

Building on from <u>last year's Family Prayer Adventure Map</u>, this year's digital version uses gaming and augmented reality technology to bring the 11-day themes to life. For example, each day there will be either a game, Bible story or video reflection from contributors including Archbishop Justin Welby, CBBC's Gemma Hunt, Guvna B, Jonathan Bryan (Eye Can Talk), New York Times bestselling author of The Jesus Story Book Bible, Sally Lloyd Jones, and storyteller Philip Glassborow.

The digital map comes to life through an app, which can be downloaded through any smartphone and was created in collaboration with Leeds-based charity Missional Generation.

Enduring favourite resources, such as the traditional Novena and the Prayer Journal were also previewed, which this year included the famous 'Prodigal Son' artwork from world-renowned artist Charlie Mackesy on the front cover.

Churches boost community wellbeing through partnering with Durham County Council

Revd Joanne Thorns shares how local churches are building relationships and establishing new community projects through workshops across County Durham...



Durham County Council is the large unitary local authority covering the diverse and vast geographical area of County Durham. The Council is keen to work with local faith communities, seeing them as key partners and critical friends, and recognising their unique and pivotal role in local communities and their contribution to a socially just and inclusive society.

The Council has 14 Area Action Partnerships; local boards consisting of members of the public, elected members, statutory agencies and business and voluntary organisations who come together to identify local priorities and how to tackle them, and can allocate funding to local organisations. As a member of one of the local boards, it was apparent that there was a lack of knowledge about the AAPs by local faith groups, and also a lack of knowledge about what local churches were doing.

We raised the question of how we could celebrate and support the good work that faith communities were doing, engage them more in the local board decisions and build better communication and sharing of information. Working in partnership with the Council, who provided funding, we began to trial a series of workshop events bringing people together.

We began in 2015, and events have taken a similar pattern, bringing people together to talk about their local area, to celebrate what was already being done and to look at how churches and other partners could work better together. We involved local Churches Together groups or key church leaders in the planning stages in order to get the best time and place to host the event and to ensure everyone was invited. Invites were sent to every worshipping community in the Partnership Area, asking them to send representatives willing to share stories about their activities and the needs of their local community. Local elected members were also invited, along with representatives from other key voluntary sector organisations.

The format was simple; refreshments, an introduction from a local councillor, an explanation of the AAP, input from the faith communities about what they were doing

and then round table conversations about what wellbeing might mean for their community, what might be the issues and barriers to wellbeing, and what role faith and the faith community have in supporting a sense of community wellbeing.

Over the last four years we have held workshop events in 12 areas, and they have highlighted so much good work being done. Local churches are often central to bringing people together at lunch clubs, toddler groups, children's activities, visiting the sick and the elderly, providing foodbanks, debt advice and so much more.



The workshops have helped build relationships, encouraging lively conversation about local

communities and the issues facing them. We have seen new projects emerging from the discussions, including lunch clubs, film clubs, dementia-friendly activities, holiday clubs and various interest groups.

Churches have been able to access start-up funding for projects and funding for ongoing projects, as well as funds for adapting buildings. Through the partnership groups have also been able to access support, additional volunteers and better advertising, as well as sharing of information. And most importantly relationships have been improved, both among churches and between churches and other partners.

Church safeguarding pledge launched to effect change

Thirtyone:eight has launched a new campaign this February with the backing of many senior Christian leaders across the UK. They are encouraging church leaders and all those working or serving in Christian faith settings to stand in solidarity with victims and



survivors by pledging to be part of a movement for change in how Christian churches respond to abuse.

The <u>Safer Places Pledge</u> has been created as a direct response to some of the recent appalling and high profile cases of abuse in the church which continue to make the headlines in the UK.

The pledge not only speaks to the horror of the abuse that has taken place, but also the poor way people in positions of leadership and their organisations have responded when abuses have come to light. Such accounts are not unique to any one Christian denomination or tradition, and time and again victims and survivors of abuse have pleaded with leaders and those in positions of power and influence to listen to them and take action. Whilst they have limited success, the stories of further abuses, whether current or past continue to be exposed.

Justin Humphreys, CEO of thirtyone:eight, launched the pledge by calling for leaders to make a public declaration of their intent to make change happen.

Justin said "As an organisation, thirtyone:eight has been working in the area of safeguarding for more than 40 years, and although we have seen much change, it doesn't get any easier especially in the face of such appalling stories. At the same time, it gives us a renewed conviction that things must change."

"Apologies and learning lessons are important steps in the process of responding to abuse, but too often that is where we stop. We must not just take responsibility, and learn lessons, but make active, tangible, timely steps towards change and encourage others to do the same.

"As a Christian, I must fight for the church and pursue what is right and just. I believe that change begins with me choosing to be the change I want to see. I'd encourage everyone who has been moved but what they have seen, read and heard in recent months to join me in making this pledge and living it out courageously."

The Safer Places Pledge contains six statements to:

- Speak up
- Put survivors first
- Conceal nothing
- Take responsibility
- Make change happen
- Hold each other accountable

The pledge invites people to voluntarily sign-up, and gives the opportunity for them to publicly show they've pledged their support. **Individuals and organisations can sign up to the pledge at** <u>thirtyoneeight.org/pledge</u>

Together for the Common Good wins strategic award to develop lay leadership

Together for the Common Good (T4CG) has won a strategic award to deliver a 12 month programme of lay leadership development within Catholic dioceses and other communities.



The award, from the Charles Plater Trust, was presented to T4CG by Cardinal Vincent Nichols, one of CTE's Presidents. The £50,000 grant will be shared with five diocesan

and charity partners; the Caritas organisations of Nottingham, Brentwood and Shrewsbury dioceses, plus Nugent Liverpool and the Parish of St Mary Moorfields in the City of London.

Each partner will deploy T4CG's "Here: Now: Us People" Common Good workshop as part of their lay formation and parish development plans. T4CG will recruit a Project Leader to coordinate the programme over 2020-2021, and it is envisaged that 400 people will participate.

Cardinal Nichols said:

"Together for the Common Good is exploring some of the most important themes in our society today: how do we build a more resilient sense of shared endeavour? What will bring about a common effort across our society? These challenges are so important as we face deep-seated changes in our way of life, in new relations with Europe, and with the created world. I am delighted that this work will be strengthened by this award from the Plater Trust."

Underpinned by Catholic Social Teaching, the programme inspires and equips lay people to fulfil their vocational responsibility by putting Common Good principles into practice and by working with others of different opinions and backgrounds. Through building local relationships, participants will tackle the breakdown in social trust within their communities.

The Charles Plater Trust funds projects relating to Catholic Social Teaching and in Catholic contexts. However, the Here: Now: Us People resource is designed for mixed cohorts of Christians from different traditions working together. It is ideal for Churches Together groups.

T4CG is seeking funding to roll out the programme more widely and discussions with strategic Anglican, Free Church and other ecumenical partners are underway.

Jenny Sinclair, Founder Director of T4CG said:

"We're excited to be working with five fantastic partners. The Here: Now: Us programme makes explicit the connection between faith and action. It acts as a catalyst to inspire lay people to play their part, from the grassroots to the boardroom. In this era of social fragmentation, developing Common Good lay leadership is a gift the Church can bring to help strengthen our communities and contribute to national renewal."

The resource fills a gap in lay formation and parish development, strengthening engagement within local communities and cultivating more diverse and collaborative forms of lay leadership. The resource also provides effective and accessible Catholic Social Teaching formation for staff and volunteers in Catholic agencies. It helps people to articulate why they do what they do, helping to guard against mission drift.

T4CG is <u>now recruiting for the Plater Trust funded Project Leader role</u>, a part-time position commencing in April. The application deadline is 23 March 2020.

Project partners share their vision

Partners anticipate that the programme will strengthen lay leadership, deepen the sense of shared mission and increase social action volunteering:

Paul Bodenham, Programme Leader for Social Action, Diocese of Nottingham said:

"The programme will help foster and harness the faith, commitment and know-how of the people of the diocese through lay formation, peer-support and co-operation. We anticipate it will help us ensure forthcoming parish reorganisation results in confident, generous, missionary communities."
